Welcome

I would like to open this annual welcome statement, on behalf of the Trustees, by thanking our commercial sponsors Oakland International Ltd. They have been funding the Oakland Foundation since 2012 and have responded to ever-increasing need in their communities with typical generosity.

As I look back on 2024, I can see the Foundation's busiest year ever. We have funded projects benefiting over 4,000 children and invested more funds than ever before in projects. It is clear that challenges caused by the cost of living are not going to be easily resolved by a change in government and that our community partners are now dealing with a permanently altered post-COVID landscape. Many of these organisations are now trying to make up the shortfall in traditional support services and acting as first responders in what are increasingly complex cases of need.

During 2024 we have achieved a number of notable milestones which clearly endorse our approach that long term partnerships within the community are the most effective way of working;

- Repeat funding for 28 projects, up from 21 in 2023.
- 10 projects funded where the applicant found the Foundation via 'word of mouth' or a recommendation.
- Continued work with HAF (school holiday) provision of food and activities.
- Examples of partners utilising Foundation funding to establish an idea, and prove their concept to leverage funding from larger sources (e.g. local authorities).

We have again seen a healthy number of applications from across our regions and have now added Knottingley site to the Oakland portfolio. We have been able to prepare for the anticipated uplift in funding applications in 2025 by hosting our third fundraising ball in September 2024 which raised a record £35,000.

As we prepare for 2025, the Oakland Foundation has a number of community partners in each region who have a great track record of delivering success. We will continue to develop these relationships and use our learnings to work with new partners. Within this year's report we have included a number of case studies showing how this can happen.

Case study 1: Be You Programme


The Oakland Foundation has been working with the Be You Programme in schools across Worcestershire since 2021. The Foundation funds places on the programme for students from schools which may otherwise be unable to afford the cost.

The Be You Programme can be tailored to each school and the students concerned but typically combines;

- On-site and off-site activities.
- Outdoor learning experiences.
- Activity focussed on developing self-confidence and selfesteem.

The Programme encourages team-building, leadership and communication helping the students to become more resilient to challenges. The course will teach students to take ownership of their own development and culminates with a graduation ceremony.

Case study 2: Athena Activities

The Foundation began working with Athena Activities in Corby in 2023, supporting them to deliver HAF programmes. During our initial funding in 2023, they were able to provide places to 270 children on HAF programmes and provide 810 meals. We were also able to support almost 60 hours of specialist mentoring to children dealing with complex personal circumstances.

In 2024, support has continued and the Foundation has worked with Athena as they delivered their Christmas activity camps.



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Case study 3: Love4Life

The Foundation began funding Love4Life , a Leicestershire based organisation, in 2023. Funding helped them establish their New Parks group for young people.



Case study 4: P & E Sports

The Foundation worked with P&E Sports back in 2016, supporting an estate World Cup competition. Since that time P&E Sports have focussed on developing their services and are now a recognised partner to local schools and a provider of HAF programmes.

Early in 2023, we had the opportunity to fund P&E to deliver a HAF programme in May half term. As this project was successfully delivered, and feedback provided, The Foundation was happy to fund further projects.

During 2024 funding has been committed for further HAF programmes in Redditch and the surrounding area. P&E Sports has a close working relationship with the main school partner of the Foundation and this has helped ensure that funded HAF places deliver to the right children.
